

Roland V. Anglin, Ph.D., has more than 25 years of experience promoting economic and community development in and for low-income communities in the public, educational and philanthropic sectors. He currently serves as dean of the Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs at Cleveland State University.

Prior to joining CSU, Anglin served as senior advisor to the chancellor of Rutgers University-Newark and director of the university's Joseph C. Cornwall Center for Metropolitan Studies.

Anglin spent eight years at the Ford Foundation, where he was appointed deputy director for community and resource development. In 1999, he joined Seedco, where he was responsible

for building the capacity of community-based housing organizations in 23 cities.

In addition to his seminal work on citizen attitudes toward sprawl development, Anglin has published three books: *Promoting Sustainable Local and Community Development; Katrina's Imprint: Race and Vulnerability in America*; and *Resilience and Opportunity*.
